weaving, kumihimo (braiding), silk reeling,
bamboo tea whisk making, shibori, kintsugi,
sashiko, ikat weaving and botanical dyeing.

Enjoy a traditional tea ceremony, engage with
local artists, be inspired by incredible design and
craftsmanship, shop for amazing textiles and
handcrafts, and experience traditional Japanese
culture and hospitality, all in the company of a
small group (max. 12 women) of likeminded
textile enthusiasts.

TOKYO

Konnichiwa! Welcome to Japan! Make your way to our hotel in the heart of the Ueno district and rest and relax after your flight.

There will be a tour briefing this evening in the lobby of the hotel at 5:00pm (TBC). You'll receive your Welcome Pack and meet your guide and fellow travellers.

Following the briefing meeting you'll enjoy a **welcome dinner** at a delightful local restaurant.

Please arrange a flight arrival time (allowing for possible flight and traffic delays) that allows you to participate in the briefing meeting and welcome dinner. You may wish to arrive a day or two earlier.

TOKYO

Today, dive straight into your handcrafts itinerary with your first hands-on workshop, **an indigo dyeing class**. Learn the art of creating 'Japan Blue' from a team of dye specialists and dye a scarf of your very own, using a variety of shibori techniques including pleating, clamping, folding or twisting.

As it's the first day, a group lunch is included at a delightful restaurant overlooking the Sumida River in downtown Asakusa.

In the afternoon explore Tokyo's oldest temple, the stunning **Sensoji Temple** and the beautiful, bustling surrounding area. There's the option to walk through nearby **Kappabashi St** (kitchen street) if you wish. A hand forged Japanese knife with your name engraved on the blade is always a popular souvenir!

Day 3 **Friday 29 May**

TOKYO

Kintsugi, meaning 'golden seams', is the ancient Japanese craft of repairing broken ceramics with gold powder and lacquer. Kintsugi can be seen as a metaphor for embracing life's flaws and imperfections, much like the Western trend of visible mending of cloth. This morning, get hands on in your second workshop, learning all about **kintsugi**.

Next, visit an excellent **folkcraft museum** filled with a stunning range of *mingei* (literally, craft of the common folk) items including ceramics, woodwork, basketry, textiles and cloth. A visit to this gallery is a marvellous introduction to the traditional handcrafts of Japan, providing an opportunity for a deeper understanding of the philosophy of aesthetics and the importance of the handmade in Japanese daily life.

In the afternoon we have arranged to visit an exciting, high end textile company known for its innovative incorporation of technology to create fabric masterpieces. One of the designers will host us and deliver a **talk on her design process**. It's always an incredibly inspiring visit.

Day 4 **Saturday 30 May**

TOKYO

Kumihimo is the Japanese art of silk braidmaking. This morning, tour one of Tokyo's premier kumihimo studios, learn all about this ancient craft, and then learn how to use the traditional tools to create your own braided item in a private workshop just for our group. This experience is new for 2026!

After lunch explore the wonder that is **Nippori Textile Town**. This entire street is filled with fabric shops, and every other textile delight you can imagine – haberdashery, leather, buttons, patterns, upholstery, quilting fabrics, silks, cottons, linens, second hand kimonos, and yet more fabric. Even if shopping isn't your thing, you're sure to find inspiration here.

Day 5 **Sunday 31 May**

TOKYO

This morning kick off the day with a visit to the private home of a **kimono scholar and enthusiast**. Your colourful and very knowledgeable host will deliver a fascinating presentation on the history and types of kimono, display her own collection of kimono and obi, explain how they're made and generally answer all your kimono-related questions. It promises to be a morning to remember.

After lunch head to the fascinating **Edo Open Air Architecture Museum**. Stroll leafy streets filled with preserved Japanese houses and shops from various periods. Experience Japanese daily life in different eras, from the humble 200 year old farmhouse to the magnificent 20th century home of a local noble. The museum is always a favourite destination for our groups who enjoy the architecture but also the opportunity to appreciate the broader context within which the local handcraft traditions sit.

Note: depending on the exhibition of the day, we may replace the open air museum with a visit to the newly renovated and reopened **Edo Tokyo Museum**.

Day 6 **Monday 1 June**

ARIMATSU

Pack an overnight bag as our luggage will be sent ahead to Kyoto today.

Leaving the bright lights of Tokyo, head by bullet train to the pretty town of **Arimatsu**, famous for its old district featuring beautiful *machiya* (traditional wooden buildings), and because it is Japan's famous shibori town.

Exploration of Japan's shibori traditions begins at the **Shibori Museum** where you'll view some amazing examples of shibori textiles. There are usually a few artisans on site demonstrating their craft. It's completely mind blowing to watch these master craftswomen tie the world's tiniest knots completely by hand at breakneck speed, readying the intricately patterned cloth for dyeing.

After the museum we'll visit a studio belonging to a **shibori artist** famous for his 'arashi' shibori cloth. Arashi means storm, and this particular pattern resembles the slanted rain in a heavy thunderstorm.

You'll spend tonight in **Nagoya**, the city most convenient to little Arimatsu. Our Japanese style hotel has its own onsen so tonight's the night for a lovely soak!

Day 7 **Tuesday 2 June**

KYOTO

This morning we are very excited to announce another very special experience, with a **shibori workshop** with the team of experts at **Suzusan**, whose stunning clothes and textiles are renowned worldwide. This high end textile production house is probably the world's most famous company specialising in shibori, and we are incredibly proud to be able to offer our groups the chance to learn from them. There'll also be the chance to visit their shop where you can admire, browse and purchase (if you wish) their stunning wares.

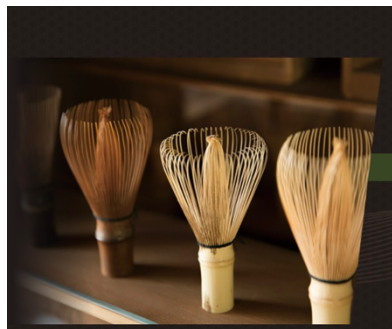
There'll be some free time to browse Arimatsu's main street, then it's time to board the shinkansen to beautiful Kyoto!

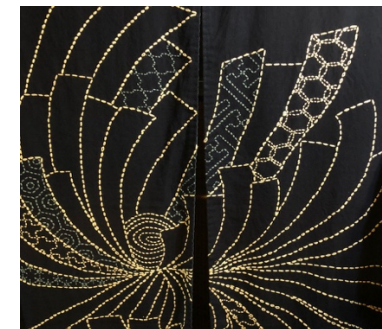

KYOTO

Today it's time to learn all about The Way of Tea, in a private **Tea Ceremony**. This exquisite ceremony offers an insightful part of Japanese traditional culture.

Next, tune into the city's spiritual side with a visit to its most famous Zen temple, the UNESCO World Heritage listed and extraordinary **Kinkakuji Temple, otherwise known as the Golden Pavilion** as its two uppermost storeys are covered in gold leaf.

Nearby is **Ryoanji**, a beautiful temple and garden, featuring Japan's most famous rock garden. The raked gravel garden includes 15 carefully placed rocks, designed so you can never see all 15 no matter your viewing position.

Kyoto has flourished during its 1000 year long history. It's in this city that many aspects of Japanese culture were born, and the city enjoys a global reputation as a centre for traditional and modern craftsmanship. At the **Kyoto Traditional Craft & Design Museum** you'll learn about some of Kyoto's multitude of traditional handcrafts.

Day trip to **Nara** today! Home of the famous Todai-ji temple, the temple's giant Buddha, the Kasuga Taisha Shinto shrine and the famous deer park, Nara is a lovely day out from Kyoto.

In addition to exploring beautiful Nara, we have lined up a **tea whisk making class** and demonstration. *Chasen* are the traditional bamboo whisks used when making matcha, or green tea. Carved from a single piece of bamboo, a chasen is instrumental in traditional Japanese tea ceremonies. The studio we'll visit is one of Japan's best, providing bespoke chasen to the imperial family and other noble families. This chasen studio is in a beautiful garden setting in an out of the way village where there are now only a few families making chasen the traditional way. Originally, the artisans in this village used to carve their chasen at night, to prevent intruders peeking in to observe their secret traditions!

On the way home, break for a walk through the thousand orange torii gates of the stunning and iconic **Fushimi Inari Shrine**.

More textile exploration is the plan for this morning at a visit to a traditional silk weaving studio established in 1894. The second and third generation weavers (father and son) will explain the history of the workshop and show examples of both traditional multi layered silk woven designs for kimono, obi and other high end textiles, and their own contemporary interpretations, all executed on enormous traditional floor looms for such customers as the Imperial family, the Japanese government and prestigious religious organisations. A tour of the weaving rooms follows, and the group can enjoy a **silk weaving workshop** on one of the traditional looms and weave a small piece of silk each.

Deep in the heart of Nishijin, Kyoto's textiles district, is a famous **indigo dye studio** and bespoke shop of a family of extraordinary and inspiring dye masters. Your highly knowledgeable hosts will deliver a talk on traditional indigo dyeing and its associated techniques (shibori, katazome, sashiko etc) and introduce you to the studio's extensive collection of antique textiles.

Today features a very exciting day trip and a **full day of textile workshops**. Travel by private coach to a tiny village to visit the home and studio of the inspiring weavers Jun Tomita and Mayo Horinouchi. Jun san is an accomplished ikat weaver, famous for putting a very modern spin on traditional Japanese ikat. His work is truly beautiful, as is his partner Mayo san's modern, sculptural weaving.

The group will be split into two groups of six. One group will learn the art of **weft kasuri** (*kasuri* is Japanese ikat, in which the weft is resist dyed prior to being woven through a plain warp, to create a pattern), while the other group will learn the art of **variegated dyeing of yarn using multiple colours**. After lunch, the two groups will swap activities.

It's always an inspiring day of textile and handcraft workshops among the stunning rural mountain scenery and a highlight of our Japan textile tours.

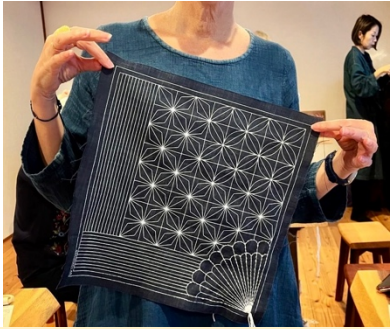

KYOTO

This morning you'll experience a quintessential Japanese experience – browsing a famous **flea market** held in the grounds of a beautiful temple. There'll be antiques, bric a brac, textiles, basketry and all manner of treasures to explore and perhaps take home a bargain (or just a memory if you prefer).

This will be followed by a visit to a studio specialising in **tsuzure ori, or silk tapestry weaving**. The master weaver spent over forty years working as a master weaver at Japan's premier textile and weaving school before retiring to open his own studio. He will show the group around his tiny, atmospheric workspace and explain (and demonstrate) the techniques and history of the extraordinary tsuzure ori weaving, in which the weaver uses his or her specially serrated fingernail as the beater. It's truly as astonishing as it sounds.

Day 13 **Monday 8 June**

KYOTO

Another of the highlights of our textiles and handcraft itinerary is a private **sashiko workshop**. You'll spend the morning learning all things sashiko and will each stitch your own envelope style pouch, perfectly designed to carry a pair of chopsticks or whatever you desire.

Near the sashiko studio is another temple that has a flea market scheduled for today, so we'll squeeze in a visit to check it out.

In the afternoon, tour a **kyo-yuzen dyeing studio**, where they practise the traditional Kyoto style dyeing of cloth for kimono, while always developing new techniques and methods. We'll enjoy a presentation and tour of the impressive studio with its massive printing tables and thousands upon thousands of silk screen templates. Kyo-yuzen dyeing originated from traditional hand drawn yuzen dyeing techniques developed in the 17th century, although its origins are from the 8th century!

Day 14 **Tuesday 9 June**

KYOTO

This morning, stroll around Gion, the famous geisha district, full of wooden tea houses and beautiful restaurants overlooking the river.

Then, it's off to another of Kyoto's famous handcrafts district – the **ceramics district**. We've scheduled a visit to the **Kawai Kanjiro House, an exquisite private family-run museum** that was once the home and studio of the late renowned and revered potter and co founder of the *mingei* movement, Kawai Kanjiro. The serene interior of the beautiful traditional wooden house is sure to inspire you, as is the enormous six chambered community 'climbing kiln' at the rear of the garden.

As it's your last full day in Japan, the afternoon is free for your own further exploration, shopping or relaxation before your farewell dinner.

Day 15 **Wednesday 10 June**

KYOTO

Your tour comes to an end today after breakfast. There are no activities planned for today and you are welcome to depart at any time. The hotel check out time is 11:00am unless you have booked a late check out, or are staying on for an extra day or two.

A list of suggested activities, venues, restaurants and handcraft shops and studios will be provided to travellers closer to departure, to help you plan your free time and/or additional days.
