Tasmania / lutruwita – Introduction

Tasmania is known for its natural beauty, remarkable history, heritage buildings, open spaces and also for having the cleanest air in the world! Tasmania has an area of 90,758km² located 240km off southeast of Australia. There are 334 other islands that lie just off Tasmania, ranging from rocky outcrops to three large, inhabited islands.

Aboriginal people have lived in Tasmania for at least 35,000 (and possibly more than 60+000 years). Abel Tasman, a Dutch explorer, was the first European to “discover” Tasmania. He named it “Anthony Van Diemen's Land” after the sponsor of the exploration. Despite the official name of Van Diemen's Land, usage of the alternative 'Tasmania' gradually grew, and on January 1, 1856, it was officially renamed Tasmania. Tasmania is known to Tasmania's First People as 'Trowunna', 'Trowenna' or 'Loetrouwitter', often written as lutruwita (there are no capital letters in Palawa).

Tasmania's vineyards produce some of the best wine grapes in the world and the rolling hills of the Huon valley are covered in apple, pear, apricot and cherry trees, which once earned Tasmania the nickname "The Apple Isle." Its superfine merino wool industry continues to set standards and prices around the world. There's an abundance of organic agriculture in Tasmania and the government has placed an indefinite ban on genetically modified crops. Hormones and antibiotics are also banned for growing livestock. More than 2000 hectares in Tasmania's north-west are dedicated to the growing of Pyrethrum, a natural pesticide. Tasmania is home to a poppy-farming industry that supplies 50 per cent of the raw materials to make the

world's opioid painkillers and the state produces about 80 per cent of Australia's commercial hemp crop.

Tasmania is home to a rich, diverse, creative community. From cultural crafts to contemporary arts, Australia's island state is home to numerous creatives and has much to offer those inspired by art, craft and hand-made.

Launceston: Sightseeing

***Cataract Gorge** – a 15 minute walk from the city centre. The reserve features Victorian gardens in a bushland setting and is one of Tasmania's most popular tourist destinations. There are walking and hiking trails, the world's longest single span chairlift, a swimming pool, restaurant, kiosk, cafe, peacocks and wildlife, beautiful gardens, a suspension bridge, Interpretation Centre and panoramic lookouts with spectacular views. Aukje Boonstra is a textile artist and tutor based on the NW coast Of Tasmania. Her areas of expertise are Creative Embroidery, eco dyeing and transforming discarded clothing into unique wearables. Since starting her Art practise in 1997, Aukje has conducted numerous workshops around Tasmania and mainland Australia and has taught at textile forums in Launceston in Tasmania, Geelong in Victoria and at Fibres West textile art event in Western Australia.

Aukje was a finalist for the 2019 Women's Art Prize, Tasmania and has exhibited her beautiful eco dyed and embroidered wall pieces and clothing at many joint and group exhibitions.

Aukje sees everyday conversations and sharing her skills and knowledge through her creative workshops as opportunities to convey her passion for sustainability and her message: to reuse, recycle, remake and reduce waste.

“Working with second hand materials is one of my passions. It is as if the essence of the people who wore and used them before are embedded in the fibres. Textiles carry stories, known and unknown. Working with those precious materials and turning them into unique wearable art pieces is what I love to do. The process of eco-dyeing never fails to fascinate me. To find eucalyptus leaves, sea weeds and barks on my walks along the beaches and town parks, have those simmer in dye pots with cloth and then when it has cooled to reveal the results is unpredictable, exciting and rewarding. The repurposing of clothing, eco dyeing and hand stitching are my areas of expertise”.

Joanna Gair has been a pioneering papermaker since graduating from the South Australian School of Art in 1993. Her studio practice is dedicated to making design-led, botanical papers made in harmony with the Australian environment using first-century techniques and traditional equipment.

Every paper is made from a blend of Australian plant fibres (Mostly Tasmanian natives) combined with post-consumer, recycled textiles sourced with the help of Vinnies, a local disability enterprise. The results are beautiful, wild papers which are museum-quality and 100% biodegradable.

Stephanie Reynolds describes her work as "paper couture". Steph delights in transforming paper to look and behave like a textile - no easy task given the nature of the material. "There is enormous variety in its behaviour, texture, feel, drape and colour."

Steph pushes the boundaries of the paper medium, creating intricate wearable garments that reflect contemporary issues and social narratives. "I have been struck, as I make my works, with the way clothing reflects female roles and social expectations, and ideals of beauty."

Her pieces integrate Tasmanian colours and topography with inspiration from great creative fashion designers and fashion houses over the last centuries.

Jude Walker is a master weaver, seamstress, stitcher, an enthusiastic teacher and an inspiring artist who is keen to share her knowledge and craft.

Jude has been a maker for most of her life, especially as a dressmaker, then dabbling in several crafts such as pottery, felting, doll making, paper arts, lead light, beading, knitting and crochet. Basket making, including rock-wrapping and amulet-making have been her focus in more recent years. Jude is a very active member and teacher at Basketmakers of Tasmania.

Linda Chee is a textile artist who designs and creates from her studio in the beautiful Huon Valley, Tasmania. Linda specialises in ecologically sustainable dyeing using Australian Eucalyptus, particularly Tasmanian species. Her background includes 35 years as a Visual Art teacher in Australia and Singapore. Linda's original focus as an artist was in art knitting but since doing a workshop with master dyer India Flint, many years ago, natural dyeing has been merged into her signature works. Linda's extensive travels through Asia and Central Asia have enabled her to investigate textiles and learn about their cultural roots, which has supported and deepened her wider understanding of natural dyes, including recent forays into mud-dyeing.

Sustainable practice and ethical clothing are values that underpin Linda's work and life philosophy. *"I will never harm the soil, the land, or the air. This is important as a way you produce. Everything that you produce gets put back into the soil again - or the waste created by you. It is our responsibility to be in balance with nature."*
